

Grape Hyacinth

Muscari armeniacum

Two-toned flowers and strap foliage.
The inflorescence resembles an upside down bunch of grapes, giving this genus its common name.

Muscari armeniacum

Family: Asparagaceae

Stem & Leaf Type: herbaceous bulb

Size: 6-8" tall; 4-6" wide

USDA Hardiness Zones: 4-8

Leaves: basal clumps of narrow, floppy straps

Leaf Color: medium green

Fall Color: none

Flowers: conical racemes of tightly packed
blue or white flowers

Fruit: non-showy

Light: full sun-part sun

Moisture: well-drained,

Insect/Disease Issues: No serious problems.

Nativity: Southeastern Europe

Location in the Gardens: Hillside Garden

Culture & Landscape Value:

Plant bulbs in fall, roughly 3" deep and 3" apart. Foliage will die-back with the flower but reappear in mid to late fall. Muscari will naturalize an area slowly, and the process can be facilitate by digging up bulbs and separating bulbils to replant.
